VICAR'S NOTES

In the events surrounding the birth of Jesus the Gospel of Luke records an explosion of the Holy Spirit's activity. John the Baptist will be filled with the Holy Spirit before he is born, the Holy Spirit will come upon Mary to ignite the birth of the Christ child within her womb, Elizabeth will be filled with the Holy Spirit after hearing Mary's greeting, and in turn Mary will burst into her Magnificat song. Soon after Elizabeth's husband Zechariah will be filled with the Holy Spirit to prophesy the words we call the Benedictus, then soon after Jesus' birth the Holy Spirit will reveal to Simeon he will not die before seeing the Messiah and because this came true we have the words of the Nunc dimittis.

As the Holy Spirit hovered over the waters and brought order out of chaos in Genesis chapter 1, so Luke wants us to see the Holy Spirit bringing a new order to the chaos of humanity at the birth of Jesus. The activity of the Holy Spirit might not always be predictable, but it is prophesised, and when God is at work there will always be new and re-creation hope for humanity. This is what we celebrate in the birth of Jesus, and it's what we need in the world today.

This is why the theme for our Advent and Christmas celebrations this year is 'The Holy Spirit of Christmas' and you can see a full list of our special seasonal services on page 3

- 16. As you write cards or send email greetings pray God's blessing for the recipients
- 17. Read an account of the nativity in a different Bible version for a fresh insight
- 18. On your Advent journey pray for all who are seeking Christ for the first time
- 19. As you taste a seasonal treat give thanks for Christ who came as the bread of life
- 20. Think of a good memory from a past Christmas and thank God for it
- 21. Pray for families who struggle to provide necessities and treats for their family
- 22. Reflect on what may lie ahead in the coming year. Be honest with God about your hopes and concerns
- 23. Pray for the bereaved and families who will be apart or in conflict this Christmas

Advent, Christmas and Epiphany Hymns and Carols for Prayer.

Advent is the season of WAITING, EXPECTATION AND PREPARATION.

Christmas is a season of CELEBRATION (God with us)

Epiphany is a season of REVELATION: the revealing of Christ to the World

ADVENT is a time of waiting and preparation for the Coming of Christ: at Christmas, at the end of our time and at the end of all time. He came, He comes and He is to come: to judge the world, to bring in God's Kingdom, to redeem the past and the present and to fulfil the future, in time and for eternity.

Advent has it own hymns ad carols which we can use for prayer and meditation in the 4 weeks that lead to Christmas Day. Each week begins on a Sunday and has an Advent theme for each week.

I have picked out my favourite resource for prayer in Advent and invite you to read the words and meditate on the different ways in which God in Christ comes to us. The tune is "Land of Hope and Glory" or any other 11 11 11 11 11 tune. It is a hymn we sing to each other for encouragement and the dark days of winter, of world distress or personal suffering. Each verse has a two-line message at the end.

- Meet your judge and Saviour, nations near and far.
- Come for Living Water, freely drink and live.
- 'Surely I come quickly' Come Lord Jesus, come.



Christ is surely coming bringing his reward, Alpha and Omega, First and Last and Lord: Root and stem of David, brilliant Morning Star: meet your Judge and Saviour, nations near and far; meet your Judge and Saviour, nations near and far!

See the holy city! There they enter in,
All by Christ made holy, washed from every sin:
thirsty ones, desiring all he loves to give,
come for living water, freely drink, and live;
come for living water, freely drink, and live!

Grace be with God's people! Praise his holy name!
Father, Son, and Spirit, evermore the same.
Hear the certain promise from the eternal home:
'Surely I come quickly!' Come, Lord Jesus, come;

CHRISTMAS is marked by twelve days from Christmas Day to Twelfth Night. My Christmas choice is a poem By Christina Rosetti and set to music as a Christmas carol. Gerald wrote a new tune to it several years ago, which became part of the Blue Christmas Carol Service.

Christ is the greatest Christmas present we can give or receive. He is given in love, for love, and by love. May all of our Christmas preparations be made in love: love for plea and gift and sign.



Love came down at Christmas, Love all lovely, Love divine; Love was born at Christmas; star and angels gave the sign. Worship we the Godhead, Love incarnate, Love divine; worship we our Jesus, but wherewith for sacred sign?

Love shall be our token; love be yours and love be mine; love to God and others, love for plea and gift and sign.

EPIPHANY is a season of revelation and worship. It stretches from the end of Christmas to Candlemas (the arrival of Jesus in the Temple).

The hymn I have chosen is often sung at other times of the year but clearly pertains to the coming of the wise-men, bringing gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh to the Baby (or rather infant) Jesus.

The writer converts the gifts into gold of obedience and incense of lowliness (humility) and invites us to "kneel and adore Him, the Lord is His name."

- In each season, and when you remember, read the words through 2 or 3 times.
- Ask God to speak to you through the words (and music if you have access to it.
- Pray for family and friends and those in need at this time, especially those who are grieving the loss of a loved one.
- Come to one of the services in each season and join in the worship: waiting, celebrating and the revelation of Christ

Bow down before Him, His glory proclaim;

With gold of obedience and incense of lowliness,

Kneel and adore Him: the Lord is His name!

Fear not to enter his courts in the slenderness of the poor wealth you would count as your own; truth in its beauty and love in its tenderness these are the offerings to bring to his throne. These, though we bring them in trembling and fearfulness,

GETTING TO KNOW YOU – Annette Walker.

Hi, I'm Annette Walker. I'm the new Junior Choir Director here in St Paul's; I'm writing in what'll be my second week on the job! It's been quite enjoyable and I'm looking forward to working with the young singers more.

When I'm not doing this, I'm a composer, percussionist, pianist, organist, and vocalist. (My favourite instrument is the drums! I did my Grade 8 in piano when I was 12, and I am currently preparing for my Grade 8 on drums. I am self-taught on the organ.) I play the organ in two Preston parishes, I play drums in several bands, and I write lyrical songs and video game music. When I'm not doing *these*, I draw and take the occasional art commission.



I was born in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, where I was lucky to be formed in my faith by the late Jesuit priest and civil rights juggernaut Father Lim Ooi Chai (Father O.C. Lim). I fled Malaysia in my late teens and went to university in Hertfordshire to read law. While there, I monitored how much worse the situation in my birth country was getting. After consultation with a law lecturer who warned me that there was no rule of law in Malaysia, I endured the asylum process for eight years, and was lucky enough to eventually be granted the right to remain, which allowed me to finally get some of my life back. I feel like I'm living a longtime dream of mine with my current profession. I didn't get to study music at university, but I'm actually *doing* musical things – that in itself is something I'm grateful for.

Incidentally, I scored my first ever video game in 2016, on a voluntary basis, while I was still an asylum seeker. I also got my music played three times by BBC Introducing during my time as an asylum seeker. With regards to live performances, I've played drums with Aziz Ibrahim (of Stone Roses and Simply Red fame) a good few times now. I feel like my best is yet to come.

My hobbies include photography and filmography, writing, astronomy, fashion design, listening to podcasts, and playing video games. I also enjoy listening to my husband's deep dives into the subjects of ships, trains, astronomy history, cartography, and general history. If ever our paths cross, feel free to ask me about my hobbies, or about the piano or the drums or the pipe organ, or about my work. I'm generally happy to answer questions!



Perhaps some of us who had also battled through the icy conditions on the Friday and seen Saturday's weather forecast had reservations about just how things would go but we needn't have worried because by the






12 DAYS OF CHRISTMAS

This Christmas song is as popular as ever and a bit of fun at party's and even Longridge Band's Christmas concert but have you ever considered how the numbers so perfectly align with biblical references. A fascinating thought to ponder next time you sing it.

- Partridge in a Pear Tree: The partridge represents Jesus Christ, who is seen as a symbol of salvation and peace.
- **Two Turtle Doves**: The two turtle doves are the Old and New Testament in the Bible.
- **Three French Hens**: The French hens are interpreted as being the virtues of faith, hope and love.
- **Four Calling Birds**: The birds represent the four Gospels in the Bible: Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.
- **Five Golden Rings**: The five golden rings are thought to represent the first five books of the Old Testament, also known as the Torah or Pentateuch.
- **Six Geese a-Laying:** The six geese refer to the six days of creation, as described in the Book of Genesis in the Bible.
- **Seven Swans a-Swimmin**g: The swans represent the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit also known as the seven sacraments in Christianity. These gifts are understanding, wisdom, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety and fear of the Lord.
- **Eight Maids a-Milking**: The maids are meant to represent the eight Beatitudes—the blessings listed by Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount.
- **Nine Ladies Dancing**: The ladies dancing are the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit, including love, joy and peace.
- Ten Lords a-Leaping: The 10 lords represent the Ten Commandments.
- **Eleven Pipers Piping**: The pipers represent the 11 apostles (excluding Judas Iscariot).
- **Twelve Drummers Drumming**: The 12 drummers are meant to represent the 12 points of belief in the Apostles' Creed.







Hymns We Love - O come, O come, Emmanuel

With the season of Advent nearly upon us (at the time of writing), so it seems appropriate to look at an Advent hymn. And one hymn that springs immediately to my mind is the hymn 'O come, O come, Emmanuel'.

Let's take a look at the words of this hymn:

O come, O come, Emmanuel, And ransom captive Israel; That mourns in lonely exile here, Until the Son of God appear. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall come to thee, O Israel.

O come, Thou Rod of Jesse, free Thine own from Satan's tyranny; From depths of hell Thy people save, And give them victory o'er the grave. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall come to thee, O Israel.

O come, Thou Day-Spring, come and cheer, Our Spirits by Thine Advent here; Disperse the gloomy clouds of night,

And death's dark shadows put to flight. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall come to thee, O Israel.

O come, Thou Key of David, come And open wide our heavenly home; Make safe the way that leads on high, And close the path to misery. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall come to thee, O Israel.

O come, O come, thou Lord of Might Who to Thy tribes, on Sinai's height, In ancient times didst give the law, In cloud, and majesty, and awe. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall come to thee, O Israel.

If there was a crowd of 100 people, with a good understanding of Judaism and Christianity, and yet non-believers at the same time, I do wonder as to which of those two religions they might attribute this hymn to. After all, there are a lot of words associated with Judaism here, eg Israel, captivity, Jesse (father of King David) and Sinai. Yet this is a Christian hymn, but it takes us back to the days before Christ was born, and longs for the promised Messiah.

It is a very old hymn, although the words above were translated from Latin in 1851. The Latin text can be dated back to the 11th or 12th century, although there is debate as to whether the Latin metrical (hymn-like) version is as old as that.

The Latin text started as a series of antiphons (an antiphon being a short sentence sung or recited before or after a psalm or canticle), attached to the Magnificat at Vespers over the final days before Christmas. There were seven antiphons in this particular set, known as the O Antiphons, but the Latin hymn retains just five of them, and rearranges the ordering of them as well. The O Antiphons themselves originated in the 8th or 9th century.

Originally the antiphons were never sung together, but one on each of the seven days leading up to Christmas.

In their original Latin form, as in translation, the verses all began with a long drawn out 'O', to express longing for the Saviour. Each described Christ in a different way:

Emmanuel ('God with us'), Isaiah 7:14

Jesse Vigula ('the root of Jesse'), Isaiah 11:10

Oriens ('the Dayspring'), Malachi 4:2

Clavis Davidica ('the Key of Davld'), Isaiah 22:22

Adonai ('the Lord of Might'), Exodus 3:15

The refrain 'Rejoice, rejoice...' was originally translated as Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall be born for thee, O Israel

In the English speaking world, there's pretty much just the one tune used for this hymn, and is the tune works for both the Latin and English texts, so it's called *Veni Emmanuel*.

This tune was first linked with the hymn in 1851, and had a note saying the tune was from a French Missal in the National Library, Lisbon. However, no means was provided to verify this source, so there were doubts about this attribution until the mystery was settled in 1966. A British musicologist discovered a 15th century manuscript containing the melody.

So, whilst the tune is pretty old, yet there is nothing to suggest it was associated with our hymn until 1851.

The choir and I are in countdown mode for the two carol services in December, getting to grips with new and familiar anthems alike.

It's very nice to see Cathy back again, following her eye trouble, and we all hope she continues to make a full recovery. We're hoping that Eileen wiil get treatment for her knee and be able to sing with us again.

My wife, Kate, now sings with the choir for the evening services at St Lawrence's. She's unable to attend the morning services at St Paul's as she rings tower bells at St Hilda's, Bilsborrow for their morning services.

A thank you also to Emily, as she's swelling our ranks for the carol services.

HANDBELLS

Once again the handbells will be ringing out Christmas before the Nine Lessons and Carols service on December 15th. We will also be ringing an item with the choir during the service – it is good to be able to use the bells in church, particularly as part of the service. The bells are a wonderful asset that have been in the parish for decades but I haven't found anyone who knows for sure where or when they came. I do know, for certain, that they were made in the late 1800's and the set is made up of bells from 2 or 3 foundries.

Rie's Christmas Recipe Nut Roast.

We asked Rie Waterman, a long time vegetarian, what she usually has for her Christmas Dinner and she was happy to share with Log readers a recipe she has used many times over the years. It can be eaten hot or cold so just as good on Boxing Day cold. Although there looks lots of ingredients Rie assures us its simple to make.

(She did add that if time is short the M & S Nut Roast comes highly recommended!!)

Serves 8

- 1or 2 medium aubergines
- Olive oil
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 40g (1½oz) butter
- 1 small onion, finely chopped
- 2 celery sticks, finely chopped
- 1 garlic clove, crushed
- 175g (6oz) assorted nuts chopped

- 100g (4 oz) fresh white breadcrumbs
- Grated rind and juice of ½ a lemon
- 100g (4oz) mature Cheddar, grated
- 100g (3½oz) frozen chestnuts, thawed and chopped
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 4tbsp chopped fresh parsley

To serve

Fresh basil or parsley

Italian-style tomato sauce – a jar from the Supermarket is fine.

METHOD

Preheat the grill to hot, and preheat the oven to 200°C/fan 180°C/gas 6. Line a 900g (2lb) loaf tin, 17cm x 9cm (6½in x 3½in), with foil and oil lightly. Slice the aubergine thinly lengthways. Arrange on an oiled tray, brush with olive oil and season.

Grill for 5-7 minutes each side until the aubergine is just beginning to turn golden. Allow to cool slightly. Use to line the base and sides of the loaf tin, with all slices in the same direction. Melt the butter in a pan, add the onion, celery and garlic and cook until soft, about 10 minutes. Spoon into a bowl and cool. Add the remaining ingredients to the bowl, season and stir. Spoon into

the loaf tin, pressing down firmly. Fold the ends of aubergine over and cover with foil. Bake for 50 minutes to 1 hour, then turn out, garnish with basil or parsley and serve with tomato sauce.

Tuesday Club


The history and work of the YMCA, the oldest and largest youth



The Log The Last Word

From the Vicar Rev. Mike Barton

It will soon be time to dust off the Christmas decorations box stored somewhere in your house and perhaps if you're like us in the vicarage you'll also find a collection of spare Christmas cards you intended to send last year, but for one reason or another you never got around to writing. Is that just me?

Perhaps on the front of these Christmas cards there will be an idyllic picture of children all wrapped up warm in the snow as they sing Christmas carols with angelic voices. This is the thing about Christmas; we have a perfect picture of what it should be like, and then there is the reality. In a recent article by the Bible Society, they point out the unrealistic picture in the first verse of the Christmas carol 'In the Bleak Midwinter'. 'If you were to believe author Christina Rossetti, you'd think Jesus was born in a blizzard, not in a Mediterranean climate.'

Again, there's the picture, then there's the reality. But here is the thing, as the Bible Society point out, before 'In the Bleak Midwinter' was a carol it was first a poem, and poems work on many levels. Take for instance the first verse:

In the bleak midwinter
Frosty wind made moan
Earth stood hard as iron
Water like a stone
Snow had fallen
Snow on snow, snow on snow
In the bleak midwinter, long, long ago

What if the wintry picture being painted is less about the earthly climate and more about the temperature of the human heart towards God – then the carol asks whether our souls are like frozen ground? This is a good question to ask, because it's often when there's a gap between the reality of our experience and the idyllic picture we paint, that such a hardening takes place.

Happily, the carol doesn't leave us cold, the final verse reminds us that even amid the imperfections of our Christmas celebrations and the things we should have got round to doing, there is one thing that truly matters: offering our hearts to Christ.

Yet what I can, I give Him Give my heart

Jesus was born amid our imperfections to transform our thinking on many levels with the warmth of his presence. This is the reality of Christmas— not a moment of idealized perfection, but of grace breaking in and through.
