

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## Vicar's Notes

On Sunday 25<sup>th</sup> January our Parish Vision Emphasis for the year ahead was launched, '**Following Jesus on Mission**'. The emphasis on sharing the gospel and inviting people to 'come and see' echoes Jesus' invitation to two of John the Baptist's followers just after John declared Jesus to be 'The lamb of God' (John 1:29-39).

The invitation to '**Follow Jesus on Mission**' and invite those around us to 'come and see' is not a hard sell; it's an opportunity to tap into the new spiritual openness our society is going through and help those who would like to move from intrigue about who Jesus is, to walk with Him and experience the Christian faith for themselves.

'**Following Jesus on Mission**' also aligns nicely with the Centenary celebrations taking place this year for Blackburn Diocese which was established out of Manchester Diocese by William Temple in 1926. The Diocesan Centenary theme 'All for Jesus' which you can see prominently displayed on the front cover of this month's Log is a strong reminder of the churches mission and purpose everywhere.

It's a good reminder that Jesus has given his church a Great Commission to get involved and that we are called to play a part. In this light, if you would like you can join in with this special prayer:

we rededicate ourselves and our church to you.  
Send the Holy Spirit to give us  
confidence in our witness,  
generosity in our service,  
and love for our neighbours,

Over the weekend of 17-18<sup>th</sup> January we held our 6<sup>th</sup> Annual Jigsaw Festival. During the event I heard one jigsaw fanatic who'd come all the way from Rochdale say, 'wow, it's quite overwhelming!' Again, these successful events don't happen automatically. Many of you were working hard from about this time last year to complete the wide variety of jigsaws you generously donated (no doubt some of you have even started again to prepare for 16-17 Jan 2027!).

Between the kitchen cooks and helpers and those who volunteered as stewards in the church with the lovely blue sashes we managed to raise £3,100 towards general church funds. An amazing effort – Thank you.

### Becky Filder – Our New Children and Youth Leader

I'm absolutely thrilled that through a successful application to Blackburn Diocesan 'Ignite' programme (<https://www.bdeducation.org.uk/ignite-project-2/>) we have been able to employ Becky Filder as St Lawrence with St Paul's Children and Youth Leader.

Becky has only been in post a couple of weeks but is already making a huge difference to the Christian discipleship and witness we can offer to the young people in Longridge. Over a five-year period the Diocesan portion of the funding is phased down, and our church contribution will have to gradually rise. Passing on the Christian faith that has so blessed us to the next generation is of such vital importance that my hope and prayer is that from next year, when the time really begins to support the role financially, many of us will be willing to contribute.

### Foodbank

In order to better serve the people of Longridge and locality the decision was taken in late December to move the Churches Together Longridge Foodbank based at St Paul's Church out of the Ribble Valley Gateway Trust to become an independent organisation called 'Community Foodbank @ Longridge'.

This was done with the full support and blessing of Churches Together in Longridge and District, and the Foodbank will continue to benefit from the continuing participation of the Citizens Advice Bureau, the Children and Family wellbeing service and a Ribble Valley Council Housing representative on a fortnightly basis.

As the 'Community Foodbank @ Longridge' continues to benefit vulnerable people in our local communities I know they are hugely grateful for your past, present and future support. If you'd like to know more about how you can help, please do come and speak to me or pop in and see the Foodbank team when they're open as usual every Friday between 11:00am and 1:30pm. No appointment is needed and you'll also be offered a cuppa and cheese toastie if you wish!

It does not involve an overly onerous time commitment, but it is important that things like facilitating risk assessments, working from heights rules, electrical wiring, and mitigating such things as fire hazards and harm prevention are done well.



This impressive exhibition of intricate knitted wartime scenes is currently being hosted at Blackburn Cathedral from 7<sup>th</sup> January until 7<sup>th</sup> February.

Hundreds of volunteer knitters from across the UK have created a stunning set of 80 individual knitted panels, each depicting a scene of Britain during wartime. They go from the outbreak of war in 1939 through to VE Day in 1945.

I was fortunate to visit on the first day and it was wonderful. You don't have to be a knitter to appreciate how each scene is accurately interpreted from photographs taken at the time.

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

**Friday 6th MARCH 2026 at 11am Christ Church, Berry Lane**

The World Day of Prayer is celebrated on the first Friday in March each year by over 120 countries. This year, the service has been prepared by women from Nigeria, and includes music and reflection as well as an opportunity to pray for women from all parts of the world. The theme for 2026 is '***I will give you rest, come***' (Matthew 11:28-30).

In the service, our Nigerian sisters call us to come closer to God and find rest in him. When we totally trust and have faith in God, our burdens become light and we find rest. We will hear the stories of four Nigerian women who inspire us to work towards a world without injustice, insecurity, marginalisation, religious persecution, poverty and despair.

We will be joined by a group of children from Longridge CE Primary School who will be leading us in one of the hymns. The service will last for approximately one hour and will be led by women and men from all of our local churches.



We give thanks to the Christian women of Nigeria for this service and pray that this service will inspire people throughout the world to unite as one in prayer and action.

A light lunch will be served in the church after the service.

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## Introducing Becky Filder our new Ignite Children and Youth Leader

Hello! My name is Becky Filder, and I am delighted to introduce myself as the new Ignite Worker here at church. I have been employed by the PCC as part of the Ignite Project through Blackburn Diocese, and I feel incredibly grateful and excited to be stepping into this role at such a significant time for our children, young people, and wider church family.

By profession, I have spent the last 10 years working as a primary school teacher, a role that has shaped my heart for children, their learning, and their spiritual development. Alongside this, my family and I have been part of this church for the past six years, and for the last five years I have had the joy of volunteering in Children's Church. Sharing faith, fun, and friendship with our children has been a real privilege and a calling I cherish deeply.

Church is very much a family affair for us. I love worshipping and attending church alongside my husband Andrew and our children Isabelle, Jacob, and Charlotte. This community has supported and nurtured us, and it is a real blessing to now be able to serve in a role that allows me to invest more time and energy into discipling the next generation.

I am especially excited about the opportunity to spend my time walking alongside children and young people, helping them to grow in their relationship with Jesus. My heart echoes the words of Jesus in Matthew 19:14:

**“To see children and young people encounter Jesus, grow as lifelong disciples, and flourish as confident, compassionate leaders who shape Longridge with God’s love.”**






### CHILDREN'S CHURCH



Our first meeting of the year on 13<sup>th</sup> January started with the AGM when we briefly looked back on what had been an encouraging twelve months for the Tuesday Club with good attendances and excellent speakers. **Tuesday Club**

Liz entertained us with a medley that included Bring Me Sunshine, Hello Dolly and Bye Bye Blackbird. Her Yamaha organ can produce sounds such as Brass Band Marches (Teddy Bears' Picnic) and light classical music imitating a church organ also bagpipes with a Scottish medley finishing with modern jazz (Skyliner). Next month on 10<sup>th</sup> February historian Michael Akers will give us a fascinating insight into the Preston Bus Station entitled Brilliantly Brutal. This iconic building, once in danger of demolition, has now Grade 11 listed status and this illustrated talk will be very thought-provoking.

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## My Favourite Hymn – Revd. Jesse Adesina

I love *Alleluia, Sing to Jesus* because when I became a priest, this was one of the hymns most commonly used during Holy Communion. As Communion was being celebrated and distributed, singing this hymn helped me to see more deeply the sacrifice of Jesus and the sacredness of that holy moment at the Lord's Table.



What draws me again and again to this hymn is the truth carried in its lyrics. It sings powerfully of the finished work of Christ that Jesus has redeemed us by His blood. It helped me to see Holy Communion not just as a ritual we perform, but as a proclamation of what Christ has already done for us once and for all.

The hymn reminds me that Jesus has not left us. He promises, "*I am with you evermore.*" He is our intercessor, the friend of sinners, continually pleading for us. He is also our great High Priest both Priest and Victim in the Eucharistic feast, the One who offers Himself and feeds His people with grace.

And then there is that great declaration of praise: "*His the sceptre, His the throne, His the triumph, His the victory alone.*" It lifts our eyes to Jesus reigning in glory. From every nation, He has redeemed us by His blood.

It is more than a hymn; it is a hymn that sings the gospel.

Oh, what truth this hymn holds — truth that continues to shape my faith, my ministry, and my worship.

**Alleluia! sing to Jesus,**  
His the sceptre, His the throne;  
Alleluia! His the triumph,  
His the victory alone.  
Hark! the songs of peaceful Zion  
Thunder like a mighty flood:

## Lychgate repairs successfully completed — Rosemary Lyons


We are delighted to report that early December saw the completion of the long-awaited programme of repairs and restorations to the lychgate at St Lawrence's Church. Log readers with good memories will recall that the funding appeal to restore the lychgate was launched back in June 2024. A busy programme of fundraising events ensued over the following 12 months, including a flower festival, afternoon teas, and concerts by Longridge Band and the Valley Singers. The very many individual donations that people made were vital in reaching the target and also pay testament to the great attachment felt towards St Lawrence's Church and its heritage.

By June last year we were able to report that sufficient funds had been raised, and preparatory work began on site in August, with the scaffold going up, very appropriately, the day after the feast of St Lawrence. Work continued over the next few months to repair and replace the decayed sections of timber, followed by redecoration and roof repairs together with smart new gutters and drainpipes. As the lychgate lantern was switched back on to mark the end of the work we were pleased that this important landmark should now be safe and secure well into the future. We do thank all those who have contributed and helped in any way to achieve this significant milestone.


## School Worship

## My Life in Saudi Arabia- Olivia Stewart

Twelve months ago, I embarked on an unexpected and exciting journey — moving my whole life to the Middle East to take up a job opportunity in Saudi Arabia. Through my career, I'd been fortunate enough to travel to this part of the world before, which gave me the confidence to apply for a full-time role. Still, nothing quite prepares you for packing up your life and stepping into something completely new.

The move didn't come without its challenges. For a long time, I wasn't sure I'd made the right decision. I had to make peace with leaving my family behind — especially my elderly grandparents who relied on me so much — missing my nieces and nephews growing up, and stepping away from my church family and brigade, which meant more to me than I can easily put into words. It felt like guilt and grief all at once — a feeling I hadn't experienced before.



Being so far away has also brought a quieter, ongoing struggle that's harder to put into words. Much of my connection to home now relies on messages, voice notes, and FaceTime calls, and the three-hour time difference can make even those moments difficult to line up. There's a constant pull between wanting to be present in family life and church life, while knowing that distance makes that impossible in the ways I would choose. Planning our wedding has been bittersweet — a season that should feel full of excitement has often been complicated by distance, with many moments experienced through screens rather than shared in person. Losing my Grandad while being so far away brought a particular kind of grief, one that felt heavier without the closeness of family and familiar places.

In those moments, my faith has been both tested and strengthened. I've been reminded that God is not limited by geography, time zones, or distance. While I haven't always felt close to home, I've trusted that God has been close to me — holding space for grief, carrying the weight of guilt, and offering comfort in ways I didn't expect. This season has taught me to lean more fully on God, to release the need to be everywhere at once, and to trust that He meets us exactly where we are, even when that place feels far from everything familiar.

I wrestled with these thoughts for some time, but I kept coming back to the same conclusion: life is for living. You only get one opportunity, and this was mine. I didn't want to reach later life asking myself, *what if?*

Now, twelve months on, I can honestly say I have no regrets. I'm making the most of this season, and I wanted to share what the last year has looked like for me.

### Work and Purpose

The main reason I moved was work. BAE Systems has a huge presence in Saudi Arabia, and I was fortunate to step into a role in procurement that wasn't vastly different from what I'd done in the UK, which made the transition easier. I work within a team made up entirely of Saudi nationals — I'm the only expat — which initially felt daunting. But what has stood out most is just how welcoming and kind everyone has been.

Work culture here is very different. Family always comes first, and that challenged me more than I expected. I've always been someone who prioritised work — long hours, extra tasks, always pushing to do more. Living here has forced me to reflect on that mindset and ask myself, *at what cost?* It's been a quiet but important lesson.

Professionally, I've been given opportunities I never imagined. I've loved helping to develop and mentor my team, learning from them just as much as they learn from me. I've also been part of the *Mulhemah* committee, which focuses on inspiring and empowering women in the workplace. Being involved in conversations about confidence, leadership, and opportunity has been incredibly meaningful.

I've even had the privilege of representing the company at major international events like the World Defense Show — engaging with industry leaders, and seeing Saudi Arabia's ambition up close. These experiences have stretched me professionally and personally, and I'm deeply grateful for them.

## Faith in a Muslim Country

Living in Saudi Arabia as someone with a strong Christian faith has challenged and deepened my beliefs in ways I didn't expect. Before moving here, my understanding of Islam was limited and largely second-hand. Being immersed in a Muslim country has changed that.

I've visited mosques, explored museums dedicated to Islamic history, read parts of the Quran, and had many open and honest conversations with colleagues about their faith. Through this, I've come to realise how many similarities there are between Islam and Christianity — our shared belief in one God, the importance of prayer, charity, family, and living morally.



What has impacted me most is the dedication Muslims show to their faith. Prayer is woven into daily life through the call to prayer five times a day. It's not rushed or hidden — it's honoured.

I also joined my colleagues for one week of Ramadan. Fasting from dawn until sunset was extremely tough — physically, mentally, and spiritually — but it gave me a new respect for the discipline and intention behind it. It made me reflect deeply on sacrifice, self-control, and dependence on God within my own faith.

Living here hasn't weakened my Christian faith — if anything, it has sharpened it. Understanding another faith hasn't meant compromising my own; instead, it's opened doors for respect, deeper conversations, and a clearer sense of how God is at work across cultures.

## Beyond the Headlines

In the West, Saudi Arabia is often viewed through headlines shaped by politics and stereotypes. Before moving here, I shared many of those assumptions. Living here has shown me a far more nuanced reality.

One of the most visible changes is Vision 2030 — the Kingdom's long-term plan to diversify the economy, empower people, and open the country to the world. It's not just a concept; it's visible in daily life, new industries, public spaces, and the ambition of the people around me.

There's also a common perception that women are treated poorly here. That hasn't been my experience. I work alongside educated, ambitious women in leadership roles who are encouraged to succeed and thrive. While no society is without challenges, the reality I've seen is far more positive and hopeful than many realise.

Culturally, Saudi Arabia has surprised me again and again. Sports like Formula 1, boxing, golf, and international football matches are now part of life here. I've attended Soundstorm festival, seen world-famous artists perform, and even watched comedians like Kevin Hart live — experiences I never imagined I'd have in the Kingdom.

## Sharing It With Family

One of the greatest joys of living here has been sharing it with my family when they've visited. Seeing Saudi Arabia through their eyes has reminded me just how diverse and unexpected it is.



We've ridden camels in the desert, raced quad bikes across sand dunes, gone on safari, explored Boulevard World, visited mosques, walked through the Diplomatic Quarter, and visited Diriyah — the birthplace of Saudi Arabia. We've even driven to Bahrain for the Formula 1. Each visit has been full of laughter, learning, and genuine surprise.



What stands out most is how welcoming these experiences have been. Far from feeling closed off, the Kingdom has opened itself up in ways that invite people in.

## My Life in Saudi Arabia continued .....

### Home and Community

I'm here with Josh, my partner, and our dog Rupert, who has adapted remarkably well to life here. We live on a compound made up of employees, and it has a strong community feel — like a little village in the middle of the city. With pools, a restaurant, and a great gym, it's a place where people connect easily, while still being close to everything.

Driving, however, is another story. It's completely chaotic, and the sheer volume of traffic is something I'll never quite get used to. I do drive — but only at certain times of the day!



Outside of work, staying active and connected has been really important to me. I play netball for *Sharq Storm*, training every Monday night. Last year we came second in the league and even played in the Dubai 7s. I've also helped set up a book club on the compound — a small initiative to bring people together and encourage reading.

These everyday rhythms — work, faith, friendships, sport, and home — are what have

made Saudi Arabia feel less like a temporary posting and more like a place where life is genuinely lived.



### Looking Ahead to 2026

As I look ahead to 2026, I do so with a real sense of excitement and expectation. There are more family visits planned, which I'm already counting down to, and many new moments still to be shared together here. Work continues to bring opportunities that are both exciting and challenging, pushing me to grow in ways I couldn't have predicted a year ago. I'm also deeply grateful for the simpler rhythms of life I've found here — the sunshine, the sense of community, and the space to be more present and intentional. While this journey hasn't always been easy, I step into the year ahead feeling hopeful, thankful, and ready for whatever comes next.

### Conclusion

Looking back over the past twelve months, I'm deeply thankful for all that this season in Saudi Arabia has taught me. It has stretched me far beyond my comfort zone — emotionally, spiritually, and professionally — but it has also deepened my faith, broadened my understanding of others, and reminded me that God often works most powerfully when we are willing to step into the unknown. This hasn't been a year without challenges, but it has been a year full of learning, connection, and unexpected joy. As I continue this journey, I do so with an open heart, trusting that wherever we are placed, God is present, purposeful, and always inviting us to grow.

## TRAVELS WITH DOROTHY LAVER – St. Dorothy: Feast Day 6 February

My younger son moved to Oxfordshire in 2017 after qualifying as a Spanish teacher. He now lives with his wife and young son near Witney, once famous for the manufacture of blankets. I had a caravan holiday last summer with friends staying at a site near Burford, a very picturesque town known as the Gateway to the Cotswolds.


The town has a very grand church reflecting the wealth from the medieval wool trade with wealthy merchants financing its expansion. I was most surprised to find a chapel inside dedicated to "St Dorothy". When the church was being restored in the 19<sup>th</sup> Century the architect created a new chapel intending it to be used as a nave altar.

I knew the name of Dorothy is of Greek origin meaning "Gift of God". The name was quite popular from about 1450 in England and was well used between 1750 and 1820 with the variant of Dorothea and nicknames of Doll or Dolly. Dorothy became very popular in the United States in the first half of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century but has fallen out of popularity since then. But I didn't know there was a St Dorothy. So who was she?

Dorothea lived in Caesarea in Cappadocia in eastern Turkey in the 4<sup>th</sup> Century. We do not know much about her but the stories passed down say that she was beautiful and converted to Christianity when quite young. She gave herself to the service of Christ and refused to worship the Roman gods. She was sentenced to death in 311. On the way to her place of execution she was mocked by a crowd including a lawyer called Theophilus. He said to her "Bride of Christ send me some fruits from your bridegroom's garden." After her execution an Angel in the shape of a child appeared to Theophilus bearing Dorothea's head dress filled with roses and fruits from paradise. Theophilus at once confessed himself a Christian and he too was put to death.

St Dorothy is regarded as the patroness of gardeners and florists due to the head dress of a wreath of roses. In paintings she is depicted carrying a basket of flowers, sometimes with fruit, and also wearing a crown of roses. On her feast day of 6 February it is customary for gardeners to bless their trees and ask her prayers for a successful Spring planting.

That must be where I have gone wrong with my garden in the past so this year on 6 February I will be saying some prayers for my garden to be miraculously transformed.

## The Last Word

From the Vicar Rev. Mike Barton



There's a saying, 'democracy is like a bicycle, if it's not going forward it starts to wobble.' The same can be said for the Church. In his letter to the Philippians, Saint Paul famously said, '*I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus*'.

A church should always be moving forward with its purpose to proclaim Jesus, because a church that prefers to settle comfortably will inevitably wobble and fall.

Or to use a different analogy, for Christmas I asked for a new set of kitchen knives because slicing onions, in particular, had become difficult.

However, it wasn't until I started to use my new set and accidentally cut my finger that I realised just how blunt and ineffective the old ones had become.

The bible tells us that, '*the word of God is alive and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword*' (Hebrews 4.12). A church that stops proclaiming the gospel as scripture presents it, loses its cutting edge.

That's why in late January I launched our parish vision emphasis for the year ahead, '**Following Jesus On Mission**'. The idea is to sharpen the focus of St Lawrence with St Paul on our core business, to proclaim the good news that through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, God demonstrates his sacrificial love and offers forgiveness, new life, and the hope of eternal salvation to all who trust in him.

For some this message may seem outdated, but this message has continued to drive the Church forward for two thousand years and is now finding fresh traction with younger generations who are witnessing how the world wobbles painfully when it's ignored.

So as we move forward '*following Jesus on mission*' we must play our part wisely, with gentleness and respect, because just like a cyclist chooses a road bike for speed, a mountain bike for rough terrain, or a hybrid for everyday journeys, so we'll have to share our faith appropriately and lovingly, depending on the context.

Likewise, in the kitchen, we soon discover that no single knife is right for every task: a chef's knife for chopping, a bread knife for crusty loaves, a paring knife for precision. Each knife is needed to prepare a scrumptious meal. So as we follow Jesus on mission, we're going to need all of your different gifts. For this reason, I'm expecting this year to be exciting and fun!

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
