Poppies for Remembrance.

Poppies are used for remembrance because of their vibrant red colour contrasted with the destruction of World War I battlefields, symbolizing the resilience of life and serving as a central image in John McCrae's poem "In Flanders Fields". The sight of these resilient flowers growing amidst the chaos of the Flanders fields inspired the poem, which then helped popularize the poppy as a symbol of remembrance for fallen soldiers.

Shortly after losing a friend in the Battle of Ypres, Canadian Doctor Lt Colonel John McCrae was inspired to write this poignant poem.

In Flanders Fields"

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we lie,
In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.

Inspired by this poem, Moina Michael, an American academic campaigned to get the poppy adopted as an official symbol of remembrance across the United States, Canada, Australia and the U.K.

Earl Haig the founder of The Royal British Legion, adopted the poppy as their emblem.

'At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them'





At the opening of the Garden of Remembrance and Poppy Appeal on Saturday 25th October I also had the privilege of dedicating a new Standard (flag) for the revived Longridge Branch of the Royal British Legion. Among the words of dedication is a description of the purposes of the Royal British Legion. These include, '...the succour of those of our brothers and sisters who are still serving in our military forces and those who have served and who have fallen out by the way of life, the care of the widows, orphans and other dependants of those who served, the fostering of love and comradeship amongst all its members, the remembrance of the ideals for which we served, and of our fellow citizens who have laid down their lives for us...'

In a world of social media algorithms, press and politics that seems so bent towards stoking division and the worship of self, the noble ideals of comradeship and service of others seem like a perfect antidote. They are the ideals we find in the good news of Jesus and it's therefore no wonder that organisations like the Church and those like the Royal British Legion are enjoying a quiet revival among those seeking a bigger purpose beyond simply their own fulfilment.

it proved to be for displays, singing, walking and foody treats! 
CHILDREN'S CHURCH

FABRIC UP-DATE - Rosemary Lyons.

We were pleased to welcome local blacksmiths Bill Carter and Oscar Duck back to St Paul's at the beginning of October to install the new wrought iron handrails on the dais. They had previously hand-fabricated these at their forge near Stonyhurst. The design of the handrails is intended to reflect existing architectural features and details within the chancel, including the wrought iron supports to the communion rail and the choir music stands. Our initial concerns that the installation might not be a straightforward job were quickly allayed. The rails had to be securely fixed down through the dais to the solid floor



beneath, and we weren't sure what we would find below once the carpet and dais floor were taken up! However, we needn't have worried as the installation went very smoothly and was completed within a day. Once the posts were fixed in place, the wooden floor panels were slotted back



together seamlessly and the carpet was neatly trimmed back into place, all looking as good as new. Particular thanks go to David Hartley who assisted with re-fitting the carpet, and to Alex Squires who will add the oak top to the rails, to provide the finishing touch.

We know that many parishioners have been looking forward to having handrails there to provide easier access up and down the dais steps, and we have been fortunate to receive a grant to cover the cost of these from the C of

E Disability Parish Grant Scheme. Together with the new handrails in the Garden of Remembrance at St Lawrence's, these two grants will enable both our churches to be more inclusive and welcoming places and will provide long term accessibility benefits for many.

Down the hill at St Lawrence's, work has been continuing on the lychgate roof repairs in between the Autumn rain, and it is good to see this major project nearing completion.

This month's meeting on 14th October was a visit from Good News For Everyone (formally Gideons UK).

Gordon Becket came with his associate Ade Oladapo from the Preston branch and with the aid of slides showed us the many things that they do in order to give bibles to as many as they can reach to spread God's word.

This is a very worthwhile Christian outreach who do more than just place bibles in hotel rooms – they also place bibles in schools, universities, prisons and other organisations, and now they also use magazines to spread the word to young people.

It was lovely to sing those familiar Harvest hymns and we didn't forget to sing 'a great big thank you' with the smell of bacon and the taste of apple pie, being sung with great enthusiasm by the children. It was also a delight to have the Church and School Junior Choir with us who sang so beautifully. The Harvest Songs of Praise Service in the evening gave us the opportunity to sing those more traditional harvest hymns - it always seems a pity that we rarely sing those hymns at any other time during the year.





Mothers' Union, nationally, is running a campaign "RISE UP" against domestic violence.



"Domestic abuse can happen to anyone from any walk of life. It's our goal that Mothers' Union members and churches will work together to be a part of the change and will get involved with our RISE UP challenge. This challenge will be part of our wide MU National Domestic Abuse Programme which is launching soon.

You may have noticed in the toilets at both churches there are posters about domestic abuse with tear off strips with contact numbers on. The idea is that victims can take a strip without anyone else seeing and get help.

Within Mothers' Union there is a scheme to encourage branches to achieve different levels of achievement in this campaign. To attain the bronze level, we have to display the posters, use the campaign prayers and have a collection point for items that, in our case, will go to the Women's Refuge in Preston. New arrivals probably just have what they stand up in or a small bag. All items must be new and will be very much appreciated.

As a branch we have achieved the first of the objectives and have started collecting items for the Refuge so we should soon apply for the bronze award.

Childhood Sexual Abuse (CSA) - Gina Gonzales

Hi, I'm Gina Gonzales

Having met with Revd Mike and Revd Jesse they thought I might like to share some information about the charity I run called 'Release into Victory' (RiV).

As a result of the trauma I experienced as a victim of Childhood Sexual Abuse (CSA) I lived in fear for many years, knowing full well the impact such crimes can have on your mental health.

For me, growing up forming healthy relationships was hard and those times I attempted to speak out to other family members about the abuse I suffered only proved futile and left me feeling isolated and alone.

My journey of healing began in my early twenties when I started receiving therapy but what really made the biggest difference was being able to speak to someone who had suffered in a similar way. This realisation caused me to establish a local and accessible support service for survivors, first in Preston and now at the Hub in Longridge (near Anji's Emporium).

Using craft-based events and activities I've offered emotional support to over three hundred victims/ survivors and you can visit me at my RiV charity shop on Thursdays and Fridays, 10am – 1.30pm. More information can also be found here: https://csasupportlancashire.com/

Be Still....

Every morning I spend special time with our Lord and Saviour, filling me with His Joy and His Peace, to revel in His love, to in-spire His Spirit and to be at One with Him. It is Life, the life Jesus gives to us, for He came to give life to us, life in all its fullness.



Be still for the presence of the Lord, the holy one is here, come bow before Him now with reverence and fear, in Him no sin is found - we stand on holy ground, be still, for the presence of the Lord, the Holy One is here.

CHURCHES TOGETHER IN LONGRIDGE & DISTRICT.

At the end of October we said goodbye to Father Benjamin Garba who has been acting Priest at St. Wilfrid's for the past six months and welcomed back Father Tony Dutton. – we wish Father Benjamin all the best in his new post in Padiham.

At the end of September we came together for an Ecumenical Service for the 'Season of Creation' and below you will find a short extract from Canon Doyle's homily.

The next opportunity for us to worship together will be on Advent Sunday when our friends from Christ Church and St. Wilfrid's will join us for the evening service at St. Lawrence's Church. (Grimsargh and Alston Lane Churches will have their own joint Advent Sunday Service on that evening.)

We give advance notice that the Blessing of the Town Crib will take place at 11.00am on Saturday 6th December.

As Churches Together in Longridge & District we continue to come together in prayer every Friday morning at 7.45am when prayers are led by each denomination in turn and last approximately 15 minutes. All are welcome to join us in St. Wilfrid's Parish Room.

SEASON OF CREATION -

Ecumenical Service held in St. Wilfrid's Church on Sunday 28th September. Below is a short precis of Canon Doyle's address.

Yesterday was the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi and the end of the week of special prayer for creation. In Churches this subject will probably not be mentioned again until September or October next Year, but it will be talked about in the political sphere. Lough Neagh is the largest lake in the British Isles and Windermere is the largest in England. Both are heavily polluted. Wildfires have devastated many parts of America and Canada and are now raging across Europe. —'the world is on fire.' While some countries are suffering from drought, excessive rainfall is causing landslides and loss of life in others. Climate change appears to be affecting the whole world.

The Book of Genesis tells us that as creation unfolded 'God saw that it was good'. We are part of that creation, just a part, but Chapter 1: 26-31 gives a unique role to human beings. Psalm 104: 29,30 tells us that creation has its own relationship with God, in some measure independent of human beings and beyond our understanding. All forms of life sing from the same hymn sheet. God has placed human beings, made in His image, under an obligation to be stewards of the earth and, as Christians, we are particularly aware of our responsibility from our covenant relationship with God.

Nowadays Christians are becoming more and more aware of God's Presence in nature, a very timely development. The Orthodox Churches in the Middle East and Eastern Europe were strongly influenced by the Incarnation of Christ – the crown of all creation.. God, who was invisible, was now fully with us in a material sense. God walked upon this earth. Pope Leo has said: 'Flesh is what we are all made of; it is what binds us to the Earth and to other creatures. The Flesh of Jesus must be welcomed. The Flesh of Jesus must be welcomed and contemplated in every brother and sister, in every creature.

The Flesh of Jesus .. Incarnation! The Celtic Church flourished in the British Isles during the early medieval period (400-900) and partly drew on the theology and practice of the Eastern Christian tradition. Christians saw God's Presence and Divine power revealed in nature. They believed the earth to be hallowed through the birth of Christ and still the dwelling place of God through the Holy Spirit- a Trinitarian Spirituality. However, they did not have a romanticized view of nature. They were alive to the unpredictable ferocity and terror of the natural world and prayed for protection within it. They were very much aware that, like a wasp, Mother Nature can sting and, if we do not respect her, we could all end up in A& E.

TERRY & EILEEN LEWIS'S CATHEDRAL JOURNEY

The first Cathedral we visited was in 2011; we'd gone on a steam train journey to Carlisle, the weather was horrendous so we only went in to escape the torrential rain. Next came Ripon, we stopped for lunch on the way to Pickering so went in for a look around as there was an organ recital on.

Durham and Newcastle came next whilst visiting relatives around Eileen's home City of Durham. This was followed by Lichfield and York again both visited while staying with family.

We hadn't realised until we went to Oxford while on our honeymoon in 2013 that we'd actually started something. We got in the Cathedral there for free when I explained we were on honeymoon and had decided to make it a mission to visit all the English Anglican Cathedrals.

Over the next several years we travelled all over England on our quest, taking our dog Roxy with us whenever we could. She was mainly accepted in the Cathedrals with the exception of two. At Sheffield we were told only assistance dogs were allowed in, however the lovely verger on duty said she looked like a guide dog to him, so she was allowed in. Roxy was a Border Terrier! The other was Wells, the ladies on the entrance desk wouldn't let her in and we were doing our best to talk them round when the Dean appeared, asking if there was a problem. We told him we were on a mission to visit the Cathedrals of England and had travelled down from our Diocese of Blackburn. He immediately asked if we knew the organist at Blackburn Cathedral, Sam Hudson, which we certainly did as our church choir had sung with him. Entry along with Roxy was immediately granted much to the dismay of the two ladies. Not always a case of "What you know".

We finally finished our Cathedral visits in 2021 with Bristol being the last one – 42 in total.... Or was it? **Next Chapter**

Terry's dad came from the little village of Brynammon in South Wales and Terry wanted to show me where he spent his school holidays - so over the next two years we visited all the Welsh Cathedrals, whilst visiting his childhood haunts. Luckily there were only six!

Final Chapter

The Last Word

From the Vicar, Rev. Mike Barton



There's a saying, 'the first thing to say about politics is that politics is not the first thing'. Perhaps that's why when politics becomes the new religion, we end up in a mess.

To this thought, lifelong atheist Johnathon Rauch argues three core Christian ideals are necessary to sustain a proper democracy.

Firstly, Christianity says, 'do not be afraid'. We'll be thinking more about that next month, for these are the words of the Angel Gabriel to Mary before the birth of Jesus. So Rauch argues that when politics becomes the new religion authoritarianism takes hold. In other words, when those in power are afraid of losing elections because it would bring an end to their government, they

change the rules to remove any real opposition. To 'not be afraid' is to trust the democratic process and have faith that other voices have the right to be heard and may have a point.

Secondly Christianity says, 'every person is created in the image of God'. In other words, there is a sacredness to every individual and people are not a means to an end. But if politics becomes the new religion with no reference to God, people become things, rather than persons. To counter this, Rauch says Jesus modelled principles of equality and even when he encountered people he knew to be morally suspect, he said, 'he who has never sinned cast the first stone', (John 8:7).

Finally, Christianity says, 'Forgive each other'. According to the bible 'mercy triumphs over judgment' (James 2:13), yet the consequences of sin are not without cost; so when politics becomes the new religion there is no higher basis for loving your neighbour, let alone your enemy. In other words, if someone wrongs you, they must pay. Rauch suggests that without the language of forgiveness – of you being willing to bear some of the cost, public life becomes a divisive battlefield of winners and losers. Against this the Christian faith recognises we all fall short and leaves a space for restoration and even a change of views.

So in the interest of democracy, what do you think?

If politics is about how people make decisions and govern resources affecting the way people live together in larger groups, then it's very important to engage - we should all take an interest. However, when people make politics their religion and worship their political party, it spells the end of democracy.

After Moses led God's people from slavery in Egypt through the Red Sea to freedom, he puts before them a choice to choose life so that they and their children will live well in the land (Deuteronomy 30:19-20).

Jesus also offers this choice. He says, 'I am the way and the truth and the life,' (John 14:6). It's your democratic choice to believe this or not... what do you think?
